Drawing on interdisciplinary studies of youth and youth work theories, concepts and frameworks, the program provides opportunities to engage with young people and communities under the supervision of experienced youth workers. Skills in reflexivity, professional ethics and cultural competencies are embedded throughout the program, ensuring graduates are equipped to actively advocate for and facilitate the agency of young people.
