

CART 6006 CREATIVE NON-FICTION

Description This subject engages with the diverse and growing field of creative non-fiction. Students will read and analyse a wide range of non-fiction forms and subjects such as the personal essay, memoir, criticism, true crime, nature and travel. They will discuss various ethical complexities of telling true stories or representing 'truth', and address why creative non-fiction has become one of the most visible and rapidly growing genres in Australian and international publishing. Students will consider voice, form and point-of-view and produce a creative assessment with a view to pitching for publication in an Australian journal.

Restrictions

Students must be enrolled in 1831 Master of Arts in Literature and Creative Writing or 8083 Bachelor of Research Studies.

Assumed Knowledge

Students will be expected to have postgraduate level reading and writing skills.

Learning Outcomes

1. Write short creative works in the non-fiction genre.
2. Use drafting and editing processes to write effectively.
3. Critique the ways in which different cultural contexts can shape and influence creative non-fiction.
4. Analyse the effects of voice, form and point-of-view in creative non-fiction.
5. Critique the practice of 'truth-telling' in creative non-fiction.

Subject Content

1. Close reading of a variety of creative non-fiction texts.
2. Writing as a form of 'truth-telling'.
3. Exploring the ethical complexities and limits of creative non-fiction.
4. Understanding form, voice and point-of-view.
5. Writing creatively in response to prompts and exercises set by the tutor.
6. The opportunity to share creative work with an experienced tutor and fellow students.
