# LANG 3014 ARABIC 306: ARABIC NOVEL AND SHORT STORY

**Description** This is an optional subject in the Arabic major, which aims to introduce students to the study of the Arabic novel and short story, and examines the historical, political, social and cultural context that this literature reflects. This will be done by studying selected novels and short stories. Students will be able to undertake a research project on a novel of their choice. This subject will also examine children's literature, including traditional children's stories and contemporary Arabic literature, as well as translated Western traditional stories.

### **Subject Content**

- The historical, social and cultural context in which the Arabic novel and short story developed; and the impact of the political climate on the content of the novel and short story, especially the war situation in Lebanon, Iraq, Kuwait and Palestine and the influence of this on Arabic literature.
- 2. Study of selected short stories and novels.
- 3. Study of children's literature: themes, language, style, moral messages, graphics and presentation.
